Forest School

In Forest School this half term, children in Year one have had a lovely time exploring their senses, taking part in sensory scavenger hunts to discover what they could see and hear, 'feely boxes' to guess the natural objects they can feel, smelling different herbs and tasting foraged blackberries. We have also been talking about how we know it is autumn and the changes we see happening in nature. We even had an unexpected hedgehog visitor when we were thinking about why some animals hibernate! During one very wet week, we embraced the rain and used different natural objects to predict and test which ones would sink or float. The children enjoyed making their own little cork boats to sail.

Year 5 children spent an afternoon working with ART-efact artist-in-residence, Robert Lawton. They took part in a workshop which focused on designing a flag to represent Oswestry. The children discussed symbolism of colours and motifs, and were asked to consider what colours, objects or shapes they could use on their flag to reference the things that are important to them within the town.

Year 3 Stone Age Workshops





Year 3 children had a great day learning all about Stone to Iron Age times. They were encouraged to come into school dressed up and enjoyed participating in a range of activities. These included investigating artefacts, exploring Stone Age settlements using VR headsets and learning how to card, spin and weave wool. They also had a go at grinding down wheat to make flour as well as weaving a model fence using willow. Finally, they built shelters using natural materials. A great day was had by all!









Nursery

The children have been interested in growing their own fruit and vegetables and learning about where our food comes from. They have grown and harvested runner beans and strawberries and picked apples to make apple crumble.

This half term, the children have been baking on Wednesday mornings with Miss Feltus and Mrs Hope. They have made pizza, vanilla biscuits and carrot cake muffins so far, and have taken them home to share with their family. The children are excited to continue making more delicious bakes next half term.

















Year 3 Scooter Training



All the children in Year 3 took part in a scooter workshop. This was a fantastic opportunity for the children to develop their safety skills when using their scooters. They were also taught some tricks which they all thoroughly enjoyed.

Buoyed on by the success of our *Welsh Three Peaks* challenge in 2023, we decided to undertake a further fundraising challenge this autumn. On Saturday 28 September, we set off to complete the *Oswestry Round Challenge*; this is an undulating route of 33 miles that follows the Offa's Dyke path. We set off from the Lion Quays in the darkness at 5.30am and returned at 8pm, complete with blisters and aching limbs. Spirits were high at the beginning, despite the cold and the darkness. We had several sustenance stops, and the sun coming out mid-morning really helped us on our way. The route took us up and down several hills, including the Racecourse, along the canal, and through a range of woodland and farm areas. With 10 miles to go, tiredness set in but we kept going,

with the knowledge we were raising a lot of money for our schoolchildren. When we finally completed the hike, we were exhausted but elated! We are already planning our third challenge for spring, 2025 – watch this space!
